Scared to help any other Sisters or Brothers up the ladder, in case it jeopardises their position and pay. To be honest, can you really blame them?

Black teachers and Educators bring some sort of special essence not only to white children, but black children too, these students need to see themselves in us and visibly see that we are paid and treated equally as our counterparts. Having the same opportunities to thrive, whether that be through career progression or on to the Senior Leadership Team, without barriers constantly being put in our way!

Right now, Black teachers and Educators are becoming a dying species that needs to be protected! Unfortunately, I see it all around me in the research and statistics. The education system to me is sadly broken. Most of the experienced, dedicated Black practitioners are leaving the profession in droves, some forced, some by choice, that's so sad to witness, as it's the future generation that's being robbed of the richness of their experiences.

I do not mean to generalise, but from my experience, for every Black person who has made it up the ladder, there are literally ninety-nine others trying to get on the rungs to progress further. They are either thrown off, or assisted into a false sense of security, just when they felt as if they had got a real firm grip. Honestly, what a way to gamble on the passionate career, you hold on to so dearly!

As one of my close allies recently said,

"Why can't we just go to work without having to wear armour, it gets so tiresome to have to do battle on a daily basis!"

She was so right! It does get so tiresome having to deal with micro aggression, overt or covert racism, while just trying to do our job to the best of our abilities and have some meaningful sort of career progression and pay, along the way.

Yes, we have annual performance goals, and somehow at the end of the year, if you meet your targets by doing all the groundwork, it is simply not reflected in your pay, but your line manager's pockets!

"Equality, we have equality, we can vote, can't we? What more do you want??"
